



Water Activities Report

This summer has seen a considerable development in the water activities skills of both the Scouts and Leaders. 

World Jamboree Report

This summer I went to the 18th World Scout Jamboree, which was held in the Netherlands and lasted for a total of 18 days.

The unit that I was in (Hampshire South) met at Ferny Crofts on Saturday, 29th of July, where we stayed the night before our journey to London early the next morning. In London there was a huge send-off event at Crystal Palace stadium, for the entire UK contingent to the Jamboree (a total of 2,500 people). During the day there were various activities organised, or we could go by train into London itself. In the evening we had a huge barbeque, followed by the a party which continued through the night until all the coaches (about 80) had left for Holland (we left at about 11.45pm). We went across to France on the Dover to Calais ferry, and had




'breakfast' (at 3.30am), and then had another stop at about 8am where we picked up packed lunches. We finally arrived on the Jamboree site at midday on Monday, where we promptly put up the dining shelter to provide some shade. The temperature was about 31°C (nearly 90°F), and stayed that way for much of the camp. In most people's opinions this was far too hot, and during the opening ceremony Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands requested that people shortened their speeches so that we didn't have to sit in the unshaded main arena for so long.

During the camp many activities were laid on, Assault Course, Sailing, Walking, local visits, computer tent, etc; although much of the camp was spent 'socialising' with scouts (and guides!) from other countries. Also on the 1 1/4 mile long site was a supermarket, bank, post office, laundrette, cafes and much more. The site also had its own hospital and two ambulances, although at one

point a third had to be called in to cope with the number of cases of heat stroke and de-hydration. Staying of the site were 29,066 people, of which 6,204 were camp staff and 22,862 were participants representing 166 countries. For



comparison this means that, in terms of population, the camp was about 4 times the size of Fordingbridge, and this was

supplimented by about 10,000 other people visiting each day, making the on-site bank (temporarily) the busiest branch of the G.W.K.



After the actual camp we then had 5 days of Home Hospitality, our unit stayed with families in Demark. Here we learnt about Danish life, enjoyed a mixed Danish and British campfire and watched a James Bond film - with Danish subtitling! After a very enjoyable camp all that was left was the 20 hour drive from Demark back to Ferny Crofts.
