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## *Chairman's Report*




For the first time Beavers were allowed to march in the St. Georges Day Parade. We had 11 Beavers and 3 leaders. They all behaved very well.

## *World Scout Jamboree*


The 18th World Scout Jamboree will be held this year, from the 1st to the 11th of August 1995, in Flevoland, an area of Holland that was reclaimed from the sea a few decades ago. There will be about 25,000 participants, of which 2,700 will be from the U.K. and I will be representing Sandheath.

At the jamboree there will be lots of activities laid on, including canoeing and sailing! We will also have to entertain other scouts at the jamboree some of the time. Our unit is doing a demonstration of gun-running (but with smaller guns than those used at the Royal Tournament!).

The jamboree site is arranged into sub-camps, each containing about 2,000 people. We will have to find something to do at the sub-camp camp-fire. After the jamboree we will stay with a Danish family for a week, to see scouting in action in Denmark.

The British contingent for the jamboree is split into 68 units, I am in Hampshire South, which has about 35 members plus 4 leaders. Training for the jamboree started in June last summer, with a stay at Ferny Crofts, and since then several more camps have taken place around the county.

It should be a very special event and I will report back on it in the next edition of *Waterlines* when I return.
