

#### **1ST SANDLEHEATH SEA SCOUT GROUP**

This year is a very important one for Sandleheath as we apply for planning permission to erect a new scout hut on the camping field. As we all know our present hut is deteriorating rapidly.



# G.S.L.'s Report




The Marchwood Regatta, in September, was the other event in which Sea Scout

Groups from the Solent area (about 15 in number) meet and compete. The sailing took place in Bosun class dinghies; the pulling (rowing) in 4 or 2 oared gigs and canoeing in singles or pairs. Again we were 3rd to our friends from 1st Lymington & Barton, in spite of another confrontation with an eccentric Race Officer who did not know the rules!

The rowers and canoeists were superb and scored many more points than expected; a really fine effort of which all those who raced should be really proud. During the winter Alleyne Copestake rejoined as Boatswain and, with Cyril Downing and John Savage, they each refurbished a Mirror dinghy. Our sincere thanks, gentlemen - I hope that you have managed to work on your own boats in time for the season.

We now have a fleet of 1 Topper in good condition, 3 Mirrors in good order, 1 Enterprise (wooden) in good condition, 2 Enterprises (GRP) needing some repair and another wooden Enterprise needing quite a lot of work. Who will help us with these and 2 rowing boats that need work? Sue Martin has started repairing sails but we really need some new(ish) sails for all boats.

To those of you who sail at other clubs, we would be



very pleased to accept any cast-off, or we would pay nominal amounts for decent sails.

Our Thursday Troop nights were well supported; some parents were able to help us to get boats rigged and launched, whilst others came later and helped to put things away - always a difficult time for youngsters when they are getting tired and cold. Particular thanks to Hywell Morris who is our regular Safety Boat driver.

Some of our younger Scouts were able to qualify for RYA Awards and I hope to involve most of the sailors this season; we have several capable of qualifying at RYA Level 3 and nearly all at Level 2. However I would be grateful for help - the Scouts need practice with knots, splicing and simple weather forecasting to become real seafarers.

Another success was our ability to introduce our Beavers and Cubs to sailing and canoeing. Especial thanks to Roger Marsh for allowing us to use his Bass 16', which is a particularly safe boat for both young newcomers and the more wary adults.

We shall be continuing these activities this coming year and look forward to support from parents, aunts, uncles and grandparents because without this help the

canoe instructors and I cannot provide the supervision and training that the Scouts need.



On the camping front we enjoyed a weekend camp at Marlow, by the River Thames, where we enjoyed Canoeing and Rowing, and spent a day at Legoland.


At the beginning of April we help our first weekend camp of this year at the field, I think everyone gained something out of it.


The unit seems to be experts at getting people wet and not just through sailing! Bogs, bridge building and the British weather are a few examples of the methods people have managed to find so far.
