From 21st December 2002 to 10th January 2003, the 20th World Scout Jamboree is taking place. It is being held in a small naval village in Sattahip, Thailand. The site is proposing to host 30,000 members of the Scout and Guide movements, plus leaders, helpers and officials. Participants will be travelling from countries all around the world, from every walk of life. The theme of this year's jamboree is:

*"Share Our World, Share Our Culture."*

Whilst in Thailand, we will not only have the opportunity to meet Scouts and Guides from all over the world, but to experience new cultures, encounter new things, and see new a whole new world.

Activities will range from workshops in environmental awareness, arts and literature, science and modern technology, Thailand heritage, sports tournaments, water activities, hikes and major events like the New Year's Eve party.

We will also be partaking in a Home Hospitality programme whilst abroad, seeing the local culture from a totally different perspective. We will be given an insight into home life in such a way no tourist could enjoy, in one of six countries; Malaysia, Taiwan, Singapore, Philippines, Korea and Japan.

There are four of us going to the Jamboree from 1st Sandleheath: Mark Bailey, Michael Chase, myself - Fiona Ritchie, and Claire Ritchie, as an assistant leader for Hampshire. The overall cost of the Jamboree is £2800. We are currently trying to raise money through fund-raising as a district (New Forest West). This figure also enables a Scout from a less fortunate country to have the same opportunity as we have, uniting Scouts Worldwide.

And last but not least, I think we would all like to thank Steve Wilfort for returning.



# Structure of the Scout Group

The means that the executive committee in our Group carries out many of the roles of the 'Group Council' mentioned on the diagram (the 'Group Council' includes everyone on the diagram except for the Beaver Scouts and Cub Scouts).



# A new building - a new future

Sandleheath Scout Group currently has around 90 children from 6 to 17 who take part in regular activities each week. As part of our lottery funding we have agreed to expand both the numbers of children we involve and the number of activities provided.

As you know all Scouting is run on a voluntary basis by busy parents and friends who are just like you. When asked why they do it most say because it is so rewarding, gives them a sense of community or even "it looks good on my CV"! Scouting is a wonderful way of putting something back into the local community and helps all our children get the most out of the experience.

Each section within the Group is run by a large team of people which include leaders and helpers. Some attend on a regular basis, others for specific activities e.g. to run a short course for a badge (such as cooks) once a year. Others assist only in the summer for sailing/canoeing and outdoor activities, others only in the winter for indoor activities.

We are looking for the following people to assist us developing the Group to secure our Lottery funding:

We will need new leaders and regular helpers. We plan to open second sections for Beavers and Cubs in September 2002. We already have a waiting list! Could you help run a section for our youngest members? Leaders work with a team of helpers to run a programme during term time. If each section has two leaders this only means 5/6 evenings each term. Training is free and local. Why not stay for your child's next meeting to see what happens?

Helpers are there to lend a hand with all activities. Older teenagers and young adults (especially those doing the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme) often help with Beavers and Cubs. Do you know of anyone who could join the teams? Again the more helpers, the less each one has to do. Helpers can also be older people; grandparents - with perhaps more time on their hands - are very welcome. Training is simple and free.

We need people with particular skills. Do you have a skill you could pass on to a small group of children?

In the past this has included scarf ironing, basic cooking, tying knots, reading maps, safety at sea, art, etc. With the new workshop we would like to run courses in basic workshop practice, simple electrics, carpentry, etc. This could involve a few evenings once a year or so. We also plan to run Saturday courses and expeditions.

We need grandparents or older "locals" who have experience either of scouting or of the local area and could tell the children about "the old days". One or two evenings a year. Would your relations be available?

Our fund-raising team would like some more help. Without their efforts subscriptions would be substantially higher. Can you offer help in organising events, fetching and carrying, setting up/taking down?

Scouting has changed considerably over the last few years and the most successful groups are those where there is some sort of involvement from every family. Please consider carefully where your talents lie and what you can do. We know that you are busy people but are sure that like us you can find the time to give something back to help your children and other children in the community. We have a fantastic opportunity here in a new purpose-built building that will be a pleasure to use.

You will find [should have found if you're reading it cover-to-cover - ed] a Vacancies List elsewhere in Waterlines. We will be contacting you shortly to see where your talents lie and what you will be contributing to the Group.
