White Water Kayaking

The last day of October and 6 willing adventurers Tom Collings, Bryn Phillips, Raffi Gracie, Harris Harden, Lucy Waterman and Lee Deakin headed off to Dartmoor for the first of this season's Sandleheath White Water trips run by Ross and me. I am pleased to report the trip was a complete success and lots of smiles ensued.

It is always difficult to judge what the river levels on Dartmoor will be like on the day, and consequently, what rivers may be available to paddle. One of my favourite Grade 2/3 runs is the River Walkham, heading into the River Tavy – this is on the southern edge of Dartmoor, through scenic wooded valleys and, above all, it is so quiet and sees few paddlers.

I had been monitoring the forecasts all week, but it looked as though the rain would be too little too late for a Walkham trip – but the first smile of the trip arrived when I checked the rain gauges (on the web) first thing Sunday morning to find that a load of wet stuff had dumped on the moors overnight. It wasn't forecast but, sure enough, it was there – and having to have the wipers on during the long drive is always an encouraging sign for us paddlers.

We always break the journey for a hearty cooked breakfast on the way – fuelling up to ward off the cold on the rivers. As the rain continued to tip down we began to share concerns that there might be too much! The downside of a Walkham trip is the extra travel time and long shuttle logistics. But on our arrival we were greeted with near perfect water levels. We kitted up and had a briefing.

For Tom and Lucy, this was the first moving water they had been on – and this was all new and perhaps a little daunting! Lucy eyed the water rushing past the bank with obvious trepidation but I

We ran the river cautiously – we couldn't afford an incident considering the lack of daylight hours – and I think I may have disappointed a few when I banned the running of the infamous 'drop slot'.

They all paddled very well indeed – Bryn and Raffi having paddled on Dartmoor before 'styled it'. The three fearless 'munchkins' (Lee, Tom and Harris) charged at every wave and surfed themselves silly. Lucy needs a very special mention – one of the youngest I have ever taken on G2/3. She was nervous but showed real courage (it takes much more courage to run a river when you have nerves to beat as well as the river). Lucy has the makings of a great kayaker and I don't think we have put her off!

We didn't get off the river until 4pm and drove back across a dark moor, getting home by 8pm. Tom slept soundly in the Landy! All tired, all smiling. High fives all round.

Resus. Update

The update is really that there is no update. Every 5 years the Resuscitation Council (UK) normally issues new guidance on the protocols that we should follow. The introduction to the guidance issued at the end of 2010 says "The adult basic life support algorithm is unchanged from 2005". In other words the basic CPR sequence taught on First Aid courses over the next 5 years should be the same as the sequence that you have been taught previously.

There are some subtle changes in the emphasis and wording used by trainers, but nothing very substantial. There are also changes to the advanced sequence used by medical professionals.


There is also now increased emphasis on getting

untrained bystanders to at least attempt the chest compression component of CPR. Evidence suggests that this is simple enough to be explained to someone quickly (for example over the phone). Chest compressions on their own can help and could be enough to save a life. The full sequence, including both chest compressions and rescue breaths, is best if you been taught it. Cubs and the Camp-fire Circle




Above: Cubs & Brownies using the camp-fire circle built last year using funding from ACRE


