Treasurer's Report

The accounts continue in a healthy state with the balance at the end of the financial year standing slightly lower than last year at £20,600. This includes £13,667 in a savings account, which is the reserve of one year's operating costs, with the remaining £7,000 split fairly evenly between the 100 Club fund raising account and the Current Account.

Income and expenditure have been carefully managed and were roughly equal at approximately £30,000, which is half of last year's £60,000. This is due in equal measure to last year's Switzerland camping trip and very exceptional grant application spending.

Grant applications have again been successful this year, with over £6,000 coming into our finances from Mandie Dawson's splendid efforts, which are reported elsewhere.

Other costs and expenditure have remained broadly similar to last year.

While some were devastated to lose their chance of a prize, the consolation for us was an afternoon of high wind sailing after the event.

We were invited to take a team to Aldershot for the first canoeing competition in the Hampshire & I.O.W. Youth Games. We faced three other regional teams, all canoe clubs, and came a creditable third in the pool slalom. After the competition we returned to the free fun area where competitors were free to enjoy a rugby challenge, ice skating, fencing etc. An excellent day out for all.

Summer camp at Cleavel Point on Poole Harbour was an opportunity for superb paddling and sailing from the campsite, supported by two RIBs provided

and run by our sailing team. Climbing run by Dave Chadwick and Stephen White at Dancing Ledge gave everyone the chance to push their limits in idyllic weather and spectacular scenery. Other activities around camp kept everyone busy during thee week, plus walks and a bike ride to Studland Beach and a seaborne assault on Brownsea Island to see where Scouting began.

The canoeing and pulling regatta produced some good individual and overall troop performances from our team, while our leaders and parents pulled well above our weight in helping to run the event. While we are unlikely to match the big groups, we have talent and with a bit more training and participation could produce better results.

Jimbo offered nominated Scouts and Explorers a prize of a power-boating day as a reward for their effort and achievement. Even a few leaders managed to get a seat. I doubt that many knew what was in store as we set out into The Solent in three high powered RIBs (around 250HP each!) strong winds and waves. This didn't deter, or significantly slow our three fully qualified drivers (Jimbo, Richard & Andy) from showing what the boats could do, or from letting everyone else have a go.

September found us at the Scout Dragonboating competition at Marlow. The weather was good and although we didn't come away with any prizes this time, we were faster and with consistent times in our races. We camped overnight, and after being variously amazed or horrified by John Hinton's perfect fried bread ("it's just bread fried in fat!"), we moved on to the Basingstoke Canal Challenge canoe & kayak time trial. We fielded our biggest team yet of Scouts, Explorers, Leaders and parents, but despite impressive times from all (OK, mine wasn't too impressive), we missed the group trophy by under half a minute.

Remembrance Day is one

of our few formal occasions, and a good turnout and behaviour brought compliments from members of the public, including an ex-Wren officer. The Christmas bag pack at the Co-Op was another chance to meet local people and spread good will.

Ashore through the winter our larger Leader team has improved activities by allowing us to run smaller groups and more but shorter 'work' sessions with games between. I think this has been to everyone's liking.

In addition to the regular indoor winter activities and evenings on the forest, Andy Brooks air rifle shooting sessions were very popular, we enjoyed climbing at Wimborne, an evening visit to Lymington RNLI station organized by Jimbo and thanks also to Lee for sign language as part of the disability awareness evening.

Caving trips took place in and around the Mendips, courtesy of Ros, Sally, Dave C, and the Hampshire Scout Caving Club. One question – is caving an indoor or outdoor sport?

Several of our white water kayakers paddled the Upper R. Dart this winter, coached and led by Graham. This is a very challenging stretch of river. Others also widened their horizons on numerous kayak trips on more local waters, including the Upper Hamble.

For the International evening, Sharon brought JJ from Korea and from Oscar Spain, who gave us a very interactive introduction to their language, countries and culture. This was an enjoyable opportunity for them to meet English scouts and to use their new language skills.

The music evening this year was outstanding, both for the number and standard of musicians in the troop. A key factor was Jimbo's ability to bring together talented musicians, both parents and friends from Portsmouth plus their instruments. I was astounded by both the quality and number of musicians at Sandelheath.

Katrina has taken advantage of the county (John Dohoo) organised Lake District hillwalking week for the third time and was invited to join the three week Hampshire Scouts expedition to Uganda in August.

Looking forward, we are re-structuring watersports on the lake to give better and more fun activities - with smaller groups and more time with each Leader, therefore reducing wasted time at the beginning of each session. We also plan to have more sessions away from the lake. More generally we would like to increase participation in activities both at group and county level and to increase the input of our scouts to the planning and running of the troop.

All these activities are made possible by the huge team of Leaders, helpers and parents giving their time and special talents. Where the incredible equipment comes from, or how people are recruited I almost dread to ask, but I have to conclude that Scouting is held in very high regard.

Finally, a very big thank-you to all the parents who have helped by turning up for their duties at the lake and at the headquarters, running activities, driving, etc... The parent rota is an essential part of our activities, especially during the summer at Spinnaker Sailing Club.

This year can all parents ensure they turn up for their duty or arrange to swap with someone else and let Ros know of the change. Without you to look after the shore we have to take Leaders off the water to man the club house to supervise young people when they need to go ashore, which means fewer activities for your Scouts.

Sailing Report

The 2008 sailing season started in style, with the arrival of two brand new grant funded Laser Bahias. For those of you that don't know the Bahia (pronounced ba'ha, bar-he-er, ba-hurgh, bar-high-er, bl-ergh depending on your mood) they are another modern roto-moulded dinghy, big enough for three Scouts and one instructor comfortably, or two or three Explorer Scouts. They have asymmetric spinnakers, roller furling headsails, and slab reefing mainsails. These have proved valuable and popular additions to the fleet, enabling us to move on the little used enterprise and 420. We have also moved on the toppers, as they were totally unused over the season.

With two new large boats, and a huge number of helpers giving up their time for the Thursday sailing sessions, our less experienced Scouts and Explorers have benefited from some intensive tuition in a dinghy with an instructor or experienced sailor on board. This has provided a much quicker transition up the learning curve, and it's great to see Scouts that were previously new to sailing tacking and gybing like pros. The easily rigged and handled asymmetric kites provided regular end of session fun, usually when the instructors and Scouts reached a point of mutual attention span closing, and needed some extra comedy! As part of a rolling programme at the start of the season, all Scouts experienced sailing at least once, and it proved a popular choice on subsequent weeks.

Our more experienced sailors were pushed hard for the Sailing Regatta, and were taken through a series of race clinics and techniques. More on the regatta itself later! Some of our Explorers are becoming extremely competent sailors, and I am very much hoping they will be prepared to give some time helping coach others – some of them already have been assisting, and have proved valuable assets.

As well as the hard work above coaching beginners and experienced sailors alike, a fair proportion of the summer evenings were spent enjoying the sunshine, and some sailing related games. Some of these were cleverly designed to teach boat handling and seamanship skills, others were just designed to get people soaked. A special mention here to Alex Crossley, for proving that Jimbo is always right, and it is indeed possible to climb to the top of a Pico mast before any part of the rigging breaks the surface of the water. Impressive dive.

On the final evening at the lake, we were planning on running some shore based activities, but with only three Scouts present, this turned into a model boat-building/racing competition. Alex Goodwin, Jack Muldoon, and Joe Liddon all constructed elaborate racing machines, complete with sponsorship and branding. Alex and Joe's fine craft unfortunately broke up, and a clear winner was Jacks brig, sponsored by "Muldoon Sails".

Some special mentions for sailing this year, based on either achievement, improvement, behaviour, and willingness to help: Amelia Phillips, Joe Liddon, Alex Crossley, Bryn Phillips, Katrina Miller.

We have had a huge number of skills instructors giving up their time in varying conditions over the summer of 2008, and in no particular order thanks are due to Rich Savage, Andy Wibroe, Peter Quinn, Les Radford, David Chadwick, Andy Brooks, David Miller, Martin Ingram, and Trevor White, for helping us out afloat and ashore (often with the never ending behind the scenes work) in a sailing capacity, sometimes having been supervising other activities and just helping with the packing up.

With our sessions afloat being split for 2009, with Explorers on Mondays and Scouts on Thursdays, this help is going to be increasingly valued, and we will also be welcoming to Spinnaker a few new faces who have volunteered (or been volunteered) to help occasionally. The new shed has been constructed at Spinnaker, and I've already started filling it, the boats have all been taken down, we hope to be an RYA Recognised Centre ourselves this summer, we have plenty of helpers, so all we need is fair winds, flat water, and some sailing enthusiasm!

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award has changed! The DofE programme has been updated and changed. The programme is a real adventure from beginning to end. It doesn't matter who you are or

where you're from. You just need to be aged between 14 and 24 and realise there's more to life than sitting on a sofa watching life pass you by.

You can do programmes at three levels, Bronze, Silver or Gold which lead to a Duke of Edinburgh's Award.

You achieve an Award by completing a personal programme of activities in four sections, Volunteering, Skills, Physical and Expeditions (five including Residential if you're going for Gold).

You'll find yourself helping people or the community, getting fitter, developing skills, going on an expedition and taking part in a residential

activity (Gold only). But here's the best bit – you get to choose what you do!

Your programme can be full of activities and projects that get you buzzing, and along the way you'll pick up experiences, friends and talents that will stay with you for the rest of your life.

Each award links and forms part of one of the three Chief Scout's / Queen's Scout Awards.

Aspirin

The newly released, 9th Edition, of the First Aid Manual includes specific caution against giving aspirin to under 16s. Although this information is new to the First Aid Manual it is actually based on advice issued over a decade ago. The reason for the advice is because, as well as its other side effects, Aspirin may trigger a rare condition called Reye's Syndrome if given to young people.

If a young person does require pain relief then there is no such advice against giving them paracetamol, so that would be a preferable option. However, please remember that the adult dose of paracetamol is only suitable for those over the age of 12. Liquid form (e.g. calpol), rather than tablets, may be more suitable for younger children.

As always Leaders should be cautious about giving young people medication, and should normally only give medication for which they've received specific consent from the parents of the child (e.g. written on an activity or camp permission form).
